

Lazar' (Leizer, Leizor) Tsirlin was the second son of Pinkhus and Sura. According to Case A, he was three years younger than Moisey (who was born in 1871, documented), so Lazar's year of birth was ~1874. However other sources provide contradictory information. There are two documents indicating 1869 year of birth, one is from the family archive, and another one is from yadvashem.org.

According to yadvashem.org, "Lazar Tzyrlin was born in 1869 to Pavel. He was an economic planner and married Fanya. Prior to WWII he lived in Moskva, Russia (USSR). During the war he was in Sverdlovsk, Russia (USSR). This information is based on a List of evacuated persons found in Lists of residents who were evacuated to Sverdlovsk, prepared in 1942."

Information concerning family evacuation to Sverdlovsk (currently Ekaterinburg) agrees with the written memories of Leonid Zolotarevsky (2014).

Family grave at Vostryakovskoe cemetery in Moscow indicates 1876, which looks more realistic than 1869 (the year of Pinkhus and Sura marriage). One can assume that some manipulation with the birth date took place in 1919 (probably to confirm that the call-up age is over).

Birth certificate shown above is important because Rzhishchev is reported as Lazar's place of birth. This is the most early documented mentioning of Rzhishchev in the history of Pinkhus' family (if one can trust the document with the doubtful date).

The original name of Lazar's wife was *Freida Srulevna*, as we know from Case G (see in comments and illustrations at the page of Dina Lazarevna Tsirlin). Later her name was transformed to Fanya Izrailevna. Lazar and Fanya had three children: Miron, Sofia (Zolotarevskaya), and Dina. For both daughters and their descendants, separate comments can be found at their personal pages. Information concerning Lazar's eldest son Miron (1898, Kiev - 1941) is limited to the WWII official record:

According to the written memories of Leonid Zolotarevsky:

- before WWII Miron and his son Nikolay (born ~ 1933) lived in Osipenko (Berdyansk), the town in Zaporozhsky region of Ukraine [This agrees with indication of Zaporozhsky region as the place where Miron was drafted to the army in 1941.];
- home name of Miron was *Моэра*, occasionally he was named Moisey or Mikhail [nobody in the family had any ideas about the reasons of this variety of names];
- Miron's son Nikolay moved to Moscow later, and he was still alive at least in 2015, but he escaped any contacts with relatives [Zolotarevskys family attempted to contact him many times]

Information concerning the location of Lazar's family is as follows. They moved from Rzhishchev to Kiev in the beginning of XX century. Dina's birth in Rzhishchev in 1902 (documented in Case G) and Miron's birth in Kiev in 1898 (documented in WWII list shown above) probably demonstrate that the family made several attempts to leave Rzhishchev, but at least starting from 1911 (when Dina entered the school in Kiev, documented in Case G) they settled down in Kiev permanently. The address in Kiev in 1919 was M-Vasil'kovskaya 16 - 4 (Case G).

We do not know when the family moved to Moscow, and either they moved all together. Dina was still in Kiev in 1922 (Case G), and Sofia in 1924 (her marriage record), see personal pages of Dina and Sofia. Before WWII the address of Lazar', Fanya and Sofia in Moscow was Chkalova 34 - 15 (used for notification about Miron's loss).
